I acknowledged my sinfulness and realized that good works will not save me but only God can. I asked for forgiveness and accepted Jesus in my life.

I thank the Lord for being so patient with me. Now, I understand what my purpose in life is. The material things that I keep accumulating on this earth are nothing compared to what God has in store for me in Heaven. I became more aware of my sins. ow many of us struggle with sin? How often do you lose so that sin prevails over you?

As we celebrate Holy Week, the Lord gave us another opportunity to commemorate His great and gracious sacrifice on the cross and His glorious victory over sin and death through His resurrection. But in remembering these, I believe He also means for us to use this remembrance to impact our spiritual walk in terms of our pursuit of holiness.

Let us look at 1 Corinthians 5:7, "For Christ our Passover also has been sacrificed." This was prompted by an immoral situation that was allowed unchecked in the church: someone was having sexual relations with most likely his own stepmother (read vv. 1-6). Then comes the command in v. 7a: "Clean out the old leaven so that you may be a new lump, just as you are in fact unleavened." This is followed by the motivation for the command in v. 7b: "For Christ our Passover also has been sacrificed."

UNDERSTANDING THE OLD TESTAMENT ALLUSION

In v. 7, Paul was clearly alluding to one of the most important events in the life of Israel: the Passover. The story began in Exodus 3 when the Lord appeared to Moses in a burning bush calling

him to deliver His people in Israel. They were subjected to hard labor by a pharaoh who did not know Joseph and what he did for Egypt (Exodus 2:23-25).

In Exodus 5, Moses confronted Pharaoh to convey God's message: "Let My people go that they may celebrate a feast to Me in the wilderness" (v. 1). Pharaoh did not grant the request later leading to the unleashing of the first 9 plagues (Exodus 7-10). However, for the 10th plague, Pharaoh finally surrendered when God struck down all the firstborn in the land of Egypt (Exodus 11). This brought about the Passover meal which was later on celebrated as the Passover Feast and immediately followed by the Feast of Unleavened Bread.

In Exodus 12, God formally instituted the Passover which involved the killing of a lamb and putting some blood "on the two doorposts and on the lintel of the houses" of the Israelites (Exodus 12:1-7). When God saw the blood on the doorposts and lintel, He would pass over that home and spare the household from the 10th plague (vv. 12-13).

In vv. 8-11, God gave instructions on how the Israelites would eat the lamb, which included eating it with unleavened bread – bread without yeast, symbolizing their leaving in haste (Ex. 12:11, 39; Deut. 16:3), giving them no time to leaven their bread.

In vv. 14-20, 24-28, God commemorates this event by instituting the Feast of Unleavened Bread where the Jews had to thoroughly remove leaven from their homes for seven days.

GRASPING THE NEW TESTAMENT APPLICATION

In 1 Corinthians 5:7, Paul instructed us how to deal with sin in the church today. Read vv. 1-6. There was scandalous immorality ignored by the church: a man was committing incest with "his father's wife" (v. 1), most likely his stepmother. This was scandalous even by pagan standards (v. 1, ESV). In v. 2, Paul rebuked the church for tolerating such a sinner in the congregation. If they were truly grieved by this immorality, they would have disfellowshipped this unrepentant man (v. 2b). Thus, the whole congregation was guilty of sin by ignoring the man's disobedience. Paul expected the church to enact this judgment the next time they assembled as a church, even in his absence (vv. 4-5).

They were to do this "in the name of our Lord Jesus" – consistent with His will and holiness, and "with the power of our Lord Jesus" – with His authority as they apply His word. This judgment would be implemented by "deliver[ing] such one to Satan" – referring to excommunication and being shut out of the church community and fellowship. The next phrase, "for the destruction of his flesh", speaks of a severe dealing from God possibly to the point of even being killed (cf. 1Cor 10:10; 11:30; 1Jn 5:16). This applied judgment is for the ultimate preservation of the person (v. 5b).

There is an important truth here: when the church fails to recognize sin in her midst and fails to implement biblical church discipline, it would give the sinning person a dangerous wrong impression that his/her sin is not a big deal with God. Sin allowed within and by the church is far more likely to lead other believers astray – more than the sin of nonbelievers would.

This impact on the church is the reason for Paul's rebuke in v. 6: "Your boasting is not good. Do you not know that a little leaven leavens the whole lump of dough?" The Corinthians were not excused because they knew this fact.

The importance of and the necessity for church discipline is based on the same principle: unchecked flagrant sins bring confusion and division to the church. As believers, we have the responsibility to encourage and build up one another, but not to tolerate sin that endangers the spiritual health of the church.

In v. 7a Paul commands: "Clean out the old leaven so that you may be a new lump, just as you are in fact unleavened." Paul uses "leaven" as a symbol for sin. "Old leaven" is the old sinful ways they were used to and did not see as wrong. They were to clean out the church by removing this unrepentant immoral man, instructing us also what to do with unrepentant members whose sins threaten the spiritual well-being of the church. The

phrase "... just as you are in fact unleavened" was a reminder that as a church of redeemed people, they were already "unleavened" – cleansed from sin's penalty and power.

This cleansing is also a call to every believer to regular self-examination, confession and repentance – and greater accountability when necessary. BECAUSE CHRIST HAS DELIVERED US FROM THE SLAVERY OF SIN, WE SHOULD HAVE NOTHING TO DO WITH PAST SINFUL WAYS.

This is a reminder that we are a new creation in Christ (2Cor:17)! WE ARE TO BECOME WHAT WE ALREADY ARE IN CHRIST! Paul gives the motivation for the command to "clean out the old leaven" in v. 7b: "For Christ our Passover also has been sacrificed."

The Old Testament Passover lamb of Exodus 12 was a type of "the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (Jn 1:29) – Jesus Christ. JESUS THE LAMB OF GOD WAS SACRIFICED ON THE CROSS AND SHED HIS BLOOD TO WASH AWAY THE SINS OF THOSE WHO WOULD COME TO HIM IN REPENTANCE AND FAITH, AND COVER THEM FROM GOD'S JUDGMENT OF ETERNAL DEATH.

How should this truth impact our daily lives as Christians?

Whenever we are tempted to sin or to continue in sin, intentionally remembering "Christ our Passover" should help us turn away from sin, motivate us to pursue holiness, and have the desire to be cleansed from sin.

In conclusion, (1Cor 5:8) Therefore let us celebrate the feast, not with old leaven, nor with the leaven of malice and wickedness, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth."

The MacArthur Study Bible comments: "In contrast to the O.T. Passover feast celebrated annually, believers constantly celebrate the 'feast' of the new Passover – Jesus Christ. As the Jews who celebrate Passover do so with unleavened bread, so believers celebrate their continual Passover with unleavened lives."

As we once more celebrate the Holy Week, let our celebration continue to transform our lives as we live out the powerful implications of Christ's sacrifice on Calvary.

"...Jesus the Lamb of God was sacrificed on the cross and shed His blood to wash away the sins of those who would come to Him in repentance and faith, and cover them from God's judgement of eternal death."



ride is the stubborn evil trait that originated from Satan's heart (Ezek. 28:15; 1John 2:16), passed on to us after the first deception (Gen. 3:1-6), and since then continues to influence our minds and affections, manifested in varying degrees in our words and actions. By the testimony of Scriptures (Jas. 4:13-16) and through our personal experiences, we can all agree that even believers - those regenerated in the spirit, repented of their sins and justified by faith in Jesus, still fight against pride and many times are not very successful. Add to this dilemma is the sweeping influence (1John 5:19) of the world preoccupied with ego and self-esteem (the non-biblical terms for pride). The Bible says that in the Last Days people will be lovers of themselves, proud, arrogant, swollen with conceit ... (2Tim. 3:1-4).

How shall we overcome pride so that we can become unlike the world (Eph. 4:17-19)? Our Savior, whose death and resurrection are commemorated on Easter, shows us the way.

"Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death – even death on a cross!" (Phil. 2:5-8, NIV).

Although He is fully God (Col. 2:9), He did not use it for any selfish advantage. Although He is fully God, He willingly emptied Himself of the benefits as the second person of the Godhead. Although He is fully God, He took the nature of a servant. The word "servant" has Old Testament overtones. Isaiah 52:13-53:12. Jesus took the role of the servant and all the pressures that go with it, even to be crucified like a criminal. Jesus' glorious being and an exalted position did not hinder Him from taking the humble position of a servant and the inglorious nature of man.

We know if pride, instead of humility, is controlling our hearts if we dislike or are offended by comments about us or responses that we think are beneath our "dignity" – taking to account our positions. We hear of Christians taking pride in calling themselves "servants of God." Yet, they would not want to be treated as slaves not realizing that in the

Bible slave and servant is the same classification.

Learning from the Lord, Paul served the church with great humility (Acts 20:19). Then he went on to instruct believers, "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others" (Phil. 2:3, NIV). James warned believers against presuming on the certainty of their future plans, saying that it is boasting and, therefore, evil (Jas. 4:13-16). Taking pride in human wisdom cannot lead us to a saving knowledge of God (1Cor. 1:21).

Pride leads to fall and destruction (Pr. 16:18; 2Chro. 26:16; Dan. 4:30-33; Acts 12:21-23). Humility brings honor and exaltation (Pr. 15:33). With humility comes grace (Jas. 4:6, 10; 1Pet. 5:6), salvation (Ps. 18:27, 149:4), God's presence (Isa. 66:2), guidance (Ps. 25:9), favor (Pr. 3:34), wisdom (Pr. 11:2) and encouragement (Ps. 147:6).

Let us, therefore, overcome pride and pursue humility persistently.

"I'm in my late 20's now, should I start considering a man of another faith?" asked the anxious single lady.

"To hasten important documents' approval and release, maybe sliding "a gift" to a staff would do the trick." thought the desperate businessman.

"A group has talked ill of two church leaders, should I simply stay quiet lest I receive their ire?" wondered the confused church member.

Real stories, real people. Their situations demand a response to prove their faith for Him whom they profess as their Savior and Lord. "Trust and obey, for there's no other way to be happy in Jesus, but to trust and obey." ring repeatedly. But how should one trust and obey?

OBEDIENCE is the practical acceptance of the authority and will of God over one's life. It includes BOTH submitting to Him and expressing submission in actions, words and thoughts. To be obedient is to be in agreement with God and what He says. To be in agreement with God is to be in a position of power in Christ.

DISOBEDIENCE is caused by a heart in rebellion and distrust of God. It is yielding to self-will instead of surrendering to God and desiring His will in ALL things.

The Scripture says: God expects obedience (Deut. 11:26-28, Acts 5:29, Heb

11:7). To choose Christ is to choose

obedience (Jn 14:15,21, Lk 6:46). To

become disobedient is to sin or rebel against God (I Sam 15:22,23, Ja 1:22).

CORRECTING THE SIN OF DISOBEDIENCE

First, pray for wisdom and honestly review your life. Are you obeying God in your personal relationships and in your behaviour? Is God's Lordship manifest in your marriage, job or business? Is He the center of your personal devotions and financial management, as a student or young couple?

If revealed and identified to be disobedient, go to a God-honoring new direction with hope and thanksgiving (Rom 8:28,1 Thess 5:18). Further, confess the disobedience as sin before God, ask for His forgiveness and accept His promise of pardon (1 Jn 1:9). If it involves others in authority over you, go to them in accountability (Rom 12:17-18).

Finally, by faith in Jesus and the power of the Holy Spirit, plan specific actions. Ask forgiveness from others; make amends towards people when needed. These require humility and self-control (Gal 5:22-23). As these are developed, disobedience will lose its hold on you and over your sins.

YES, Christ our Lord CALLS us to choose obedience (Jn 14:15) as our act of worship to Him (Rom 12:1), proving our love for Him (1 Jn 5:2–3, 2

Jn 6) and completing the journey to holiness in fear of God (2 Cor 7:1).

Will you choose to obey or still believe that there's another way?

also attended other churches upon invitation of friends but the good news did not sink in.

I was deeply addicted to pornography. It became a part of my daily life and could not go on a day without it. I was a womanizer, having relationships only to satisfy my desires. I drank occasionally to the point that I ignored my well-being and that of others.

An elder shared the gospel and it struck me, I did not understand what Jesus has done for me. I was so amazed with the salvation story. I then recognized my need to study the Bible. It dawned on me that I have read many medical books but I did not know anything about the Bible.

That night I looked for the Bible given to us on our wedding day. It was on the shelf accumulating dust. I read the story of Jesus' crucifixion together with the two robbers. I reflected on Eph 2:8-9 "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith, and, so this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God, not by works so that no one can boast." Three days after hearing the gospel and reading the Bible, I made the decision to accept Jesus. I prayed recognizing that I am a sinner. I acknowledged that Jesus died on the cross to save me and decided to put my faith in Jesus as my Lord.

Now my view of success changed from professional success to living for Christ. I'm excited to attend Sunday service to worship Him and listen to His message. I desire to study the Bible and try to have a personal devotion every day. I am conscious of my sin and ask God for forgiveness. I pray knowing I need Him. I am thankful for everything I am and what I have are gifts from Him.

Now when I see my patients, I do not only have a medical evaluation but also a desire to minister to them and share the gospel. I have a lot to learn, but by God's grace I hope to grow spiritually, be able to win souls for Christ and encourage them to do the same.



od is unspeakably holy! To render expression to His resplendence, the prophet Isaiah's tri-hagion, an inspired account of the worship of seraphim before God, gives us a glimpse of glory:

"Holy, Holy, Holy, is the Lord of hosts, The whole earth is full of His glory."

Isaiah 6:3

Like the brilliance of a beautiful diamond against black velvet, our Redeemer pierces with the Sword of His Spirit the darkness, decay and deadness of our three-pronged enemy: Satan, the world and self.

"And he led Him up and showed Him all the kingdoms of the world in a moment of time.

And the devil said to Him, 'I will give You all this domain and its glory; ... Therefore if You worship before me, it shall all be Yours.'

Jesus answered him, "It is written, You shall worship the Lord your God and serve Him only."

Luke 4:5-8

Even now, Satan blinds unbelieving eyes to Truth: "Even though they knew God, they did not honor Him as God or give thanks, but they became futile in their speculations, and their foolish heart was darkened" (Romans 1:21).

But God is HOLY FATHER. His sublime name shall stamp out this Evil one: "You led Your people, To make for Yourself a glorious name... You, O Lord, are our Father, our Redeemer from of old is Your name" (Isaiah 63:14,16).

Even now, those steeped in self-love corrupt hearts by a disorder of worship, for "they exchanged the truth of God for a lie, and worshiped and served the creature rather than the Creator, who is blessed forever" (Romans 1:25).

But God is HOLY SON. His superior worth can topple idols of self: "He died for all, so that they who live might no longer live for themselves, but for Him who died and rose again on their behalf" (2 Corinthians 5:15).

Even now, those who love this world "...did not see fit to acknowledge God any longer, [so] God gave them over to a depraved mind, to do those things which are not proper... but also give hearty approval to those who practice them" (Romans 1:28, 32).

But God is HOLY SPIRIT. He is singularly able to sanctify saints from this spiritually bankrupt world. "He saved us, not on the basis of deeds which we have done in righteousness, but according to His mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewing by the Holy Spirit" (Titus 3:5).

This evil tide threatens to undo us. Yet, "this hope we have as an anchor of the soul, a hope both sure and steadfast" (Hebrews 6:19): to sail without shipwreck on the sea of sin, compelled by the seamless love and incorruptible triune holiness of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit.

"Well, dear brethren and sisters, as we do not wish to be out of gear with the works of God, or opposed to his nearest attendants, or in rebellion against the sacred Trinity, let us stand to it that our souls shall glory only in the Lord as long as we live." (Charles Spurgeon)
